

Personal Literary Reflection
Final Essay Due: Saturday, May 16th by 5pm

Prompt: What novel or play has personally impacted you and what did this cause you to learn about yourself?

This impact can come in a variety of ways from causing you to question the world around you, allowing you to better understand yourself and others, or simply allowing you to realize that you actually enjoy reading!! By reflecting on this text you should discover the inner workings of your personality. Your essay should explore several moments of realization and include textual support from your text that helped to spark these moments.

Your essay must contain an original analysis. By original I mean that this essay must be comprised wholly of your own individual words and ideas, not someone else's. I want to know what you think about and what connected with you in the work that sparked your personal literary growth.

Advice: Think carefully about which text you are going to use as your catalyst. For some, the answer might be blatantly obvious, but for others it might involve reviewing everything that you have read since the 5th grade. Your essay should not be about a book that you read for school "that actually wasn't that bad". This should be personal!

In an essay of between 900 and 1100 words, (roughly 3 pages double-spaced NOT including the works cited) write an original analysis on a novel or play from your personal reading that has caused you to have an "awakening". You will need to include a quote from your text, so make sure it is something that you either have a copy of or can find textual examples from online.

Format:

- Include the following in the upper left-hand side of the first page: your name; a title for your paper; the number of words in your paper; the class name; the date
- Length: 900 words minimum; 1100 words maximum.
- Number each page with your last name in the upper right hand corner.
- Cite your quotes using MLA parenthetical citation style: i.e. (Austen 120).
- Type your essay with double spacing and 1" margins; use 12 pt. Times New Roman font.
- You must include a works cited page with this assignment.
